Grand Commander Seale to Address Arkansas Honors Day Banquet


Sovereign Grand Commander Ronald A Seale will give the keynote address at our Arkansas Honors Day Banquet on Saturday, October 17, 2015 at the Albert Pike Memorial Temple. Grand Commander Seale will be with us at all of the activities during our 2015 Honors Day. This will be the first time that a Grand Commander has visited an Arkansas Honors Day in many years.

III. Brother Seale was elected Sovereign Grand Commander of the Supreme Council Southern Jurisdiction, October 3, 2003, and was installed October 7, 2003. He is a native of Baton Rouge, Louisiana. He attended public schools in Baton Rouge before graduating with a B.A. from Louisiana State University in 1970 and with a Doctorate in Jurisprudence from Cumberland School of Law, Samford University in 1973. He entered law practice (general and civil litigation) in Baton Rouge in 1974 and is a member of the American Bar Association, Baton Rouge Bar Association, and International Association of Defense Council.

Beginning a lifelong interest in DeMolay at age 14, III. Brother Seale

became a member of Pelican Chapter. He served as Master Councilor and received the Chevalier Degree. As an adult, he served as Chapter Advisor, received the Active Legion of Honor, and currently is an Active Member of DeMolay International Supreme Council. III. Brother Seale's Masonic career began at age 21, while a student at LSU, when he was initiated in East Gate Lodge No. 452, Louisiana. He presided as Worshipful Master in 1988 and has served as a member of the Lou-

isiana Grand Lodge Committee on Masonic Law and Jurisprudence. A member of the Scottish Rite Bodies in Baton Rouge, he participated in several degree teams of the Valley. He was honored as Knight Commander Court of Honor in 1977 and coroneted an Inspector General, 33°, in 1993. He and his wife Saundra have two children.



Brethren who have been elected to receive the 33rd degree and the Knight Commander of the Court of Honour will receive those honors on October 17. The 33rd degree will be conferred at 10 am (33rd degree and elects only) with a public capping to follow at about 11:15 am. All brethren, regardless of degree, family, and friends are welcome at the public capping. Lunch will be served and the KCCH will be invested at 2 pm (33rds, KCCH, and elects only) with a public capping of the KCCH honorees to follow at about 3:15 pm. Again, all brethren, family, and friends are welcome to attend the public capping. banquet will follow that evening at 6 pm. Dress for the event is black tuxedo (preferred) or dark suit for

men and Sunday attire for the ladies.

Why I Joined!

I always felt that at some point in my life I would become a Mason and join the Scottish Rite, but what the catalyst for this would be I wasn't sure. It turned out it was an early unforeseen retirement from Arkansas Blue Cross and Blue Shield. With retirement I had the time to become involved and do the work

necessary to become a Mason.

A few years after I graduated with a degree in Computer Science from University of Central Arkansas and

started work for Blue Cross and Blue Shield I married Joyce Stalnaker. Our marriage spurred an interest, which came from my Brother-in-law Michael Stalnaker. Until that point I had no real insight or contact with anyone on a personal basis who was a mason. Mike was in Iron Mountain Lodge and Scottish Rite and always had something to talk about regarding lodge related activities. I also became aware that my Father-in-Law Ray Stalnaker had been a Scottish Rite Mason since the early 60s.

Finally in 2013 I had talked with a good friend (Terry Minton) about Masonry. Rather than encourage me he said that there was a lot of memory work and that at my age, "he doubted if he would do it". Not to be discouraged, I mentioned my interest to him a second time. He said he would get me a petition, but that I should consider speaking with J.O. Issac about Cabot Lodge #319. I called Bro. Issac, we talked about Masonry and what that

meant, the time commitment, service commitment, ment, and the financial commitment. J.O. brought me a petition and the rest is water un-

der the bridge. I did my EA work from October to November of 2013. Then, during November 2013 Ray had a severe stroke. It had never occurred to me that as an Entered Apprentice candidate I could have had Ray or Mike at my initiation. The first time I spoke to them about my initiation at Cabot Lodge #319 we were at the hospital. They were shocked and amazed. Mike talked about helping with my lecture work. Mike loved his brethren, and being a Scottish Rite Mason. *Continued Next Page*



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Like a good son and mason Mike had moved home to help his mother take care of Ray who was recuperating from stroke complications. During that time Michael died from a combination of prescribed medications and flu. Unfortunately neither he nor Ray came to my degrees but they have been with me since then and will always be with me as I search for more Light in Masonry.

Ray and Mike's love for the Scottish Rite made it seem like a natural progression. I had heard of the Scottish Rite and knew about the organization from Ray and Mike. After I had received my Master Mason degree in April 2014 I sent a petition to Scottish rite for the May reunion. It was a one day reunion with 21 candidates.

I participated in a degree during the Fall 2014 reunion and marched with the Camp Guard in two degrees during the spring 2015 reunion. For me the familiarity of the activities, the men of Scottish Rite and the structure of the fraternity is what appeals to me. As I have been told you get out of it what you contribute. I try to attend the monthly stated meeting and continue to work to gain further insight into the meaning of Scottish Rite. In May I was able to participate in the "Seldom Seen Degree Program" and worked in the 8th degree.

The Double Headed Eagle

Each Reunion, a new brother will ask about the Double Headed Eagle. Here's a reprint of an old article explaining the meaning and origins of our symbol.

Long used as the insignia of a Scottish Rite Mason, the "Double Headed Eagle of Lagash" is now the accepted

emblem in the United States of America of the 32 Degree. It is the oldest crest in the world. It was a symbol of power more than two thousand years before the build-

ing of King Solomon's Temple. No other heraldic bearing, no other emblematic device of today can boast such antiquity. The double-headed eagle first originated in the mighty Sumerian city of Lagash. From cylinders taken from the ruins of this ancient city, the double-headed eagle seems to have been known to the kings of the time as the Storm Bird. From the Sumerians this symbol passed to the men of Akkad, from whom it was brought to the Emperors of the East and West by the Crusades. Charlemagne first made use of the double-headed eagle when he became head of the German Empire, the two heads denoting the union of Rome and Germany, in AD 802. There seem to be some who believe that the double-headed eagle may have been a Masonic symbol as early as the twelfth cen-

tury, but, it probably was first known to Freemasonry in 1758, upon the establishment of the Council of Emperors of the East and West in Paris. This was a part of the Rite of

Perfection, a Rite of twenty-five degrees, from which evolved a large part of the present system of The Scottish Rite. The successors today of the council of Emperors of and West, are the various Supreme Councils of the Thirty-third Degree throughout the world. They have inherited the insignia of the personal emblem of Frederick the Great, First Sovereign Grand commander, who conferred upon the rite the right to use in 1786; at which time seven (Continued Next Page)



(Continued From Previous Page) additional Degrees were "adopted" making which was added a governing Degree, the 33rd. The double headed eagle of Lagash is a white and black eagle. The head, neck, legs and tips of the wings are white, while the body and wings are black. Its wings are extended, yet drooping; in its claws is a naked sword, one talon of the right claw clutching the hilt of the steel serpentine shaped blade, the left claw grasping the blade.

If there is any issue, please reach out to us, we may be able to help, but we cannot if we do not know my brethren. I am asking you to make a choice. Make the choice between making the Scottish Rite fraternity grow in Arkansas or becoming just another statistic in the Masonic decline present in the world today. If you need to pay your dues, please do so, there are lots of ways we can make it easy on you. If you have a Master Mason friend that you need to talk to about the Scottish Rite, please do so and let us know. We can help get him initiated at his convenience. And finally, if you are a Master Mason that has already been suspended in the Scottish Rite for non-payment of dues, please consider returning to us my brother, I assure you the Rite is much different from when you left. Craddock owns the Craftsman's Apron and is one of the premier experts on the evolution and design of the Masonic Apron. His presentation was lively and included many opportunities for questions and discussions. Those present witnessed an excellent treatise on how our masonic apron has developed and changed since the beginning of the apron itself.

The speaker series is a benefit of the Scottish rite members in Fayetteville. The valley invites master masons to attend even if they are not Scottish rite masons. The first speaker was MW Bro. Michael Halleran, who spoke about the American Civil War and

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freemasonry. The valley is in negotiations with several speakers to schedule our 2016 speakers.

Since we are the University of Freemasonry, speakers such as these are necessary to continue our masonic education. I hope to see more brethren at next year's symposium.



The Jurisdiction of the Supreme Council includes all the territory over which the United States of America exercises domain of powers of government, except the states of Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, and Wisconsin, which were apportioned by the Supreme Council to the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction of the United States. The jurisdiction of this Supreme Council also includes those countries where it has established, or may hereafter establish, Bodies of the Rite, and over which countries no regular Supreme Council has acquired jurisdiction.
