
## Ill. Wilbur D. Mills, 33°, Grand Cross

Ill. Wilbur D. Mills, 33°, G.C. was a member of the United States House of Representatives from Arkansas from January 1939 to January 1977, becoming the longest-serving Congress-

man ever from our State. Brother Mills was born in Kensett, AR, he graduated from Hendricks College in Conway as salutatorian before going on to study constitutional law at Harvard Law School in Cambridge, Massachusetts. After receiving his law degree and being admitted to the bar in 1933, Brother Mills began his political career in hometown local politics in White County serving as its 29th County Judge from 1935 to 1939. He went on to have a long and effective career in the U.S. House of Representatives, serving an outstanding thirty-eight years. Seventeen of those thirty-eight years were spent as Chairman of the powerful Ways and Means Committee, a post he held longer than any other person in U.S. history. Because of this fact, he was dubbed "the most powerful man in Washington." It will be well worth your time to read the no-holds barred biography of Brother Mills by Kay C. Goss. Brother Mills served our country and our state with distinction for

a lifetime but he had his demons as well. I truly believe that you will enjoy learning more about this brother that was able to win, lose and reconcile it all at the end. You can find this

During his last years in Congress and until his death, Ill Brother Mills raised funds for alcohol recovery centers and programs and spoke nationally on the subject. The acclaimed Wilbur D. Mills Treatment Center for Alcohol and Drug Abuse was built in his honor in Searcy.

At least twelve other Arkansas facilities are named for him, including the Wilbur D. Mills University Studies High School in Sweet Home (Pulaski County); the two Wilbur D. Mills Endowed Chairs on Alcohol and Drug Abuse Prevention at the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences; the Wilbur D. Mills Social Sciences Building at Hendrix College; the Wilbur D. Mills Freeway (Interstate 630); and the Wilbur D. Mills Lock and Dam on the Arkansas River. Mills was inducted into the Arkansas Agriculture Hall of Fame in Little Rock (Pulaski County) and the Arkansas River Hall of Fame in Tulsa, Oklahoma.

## **REUNION**


It is spring again, and time for the spring reunions for our Valleys. For Scottish Rite Masons, we may think of a reunion as the time when we do these things:

- -- Bring in new members
- -- Put on some of the degrees
- -- Pull out the ritual again and refresh the memory on your part
  - -- Or learn a new part in one of the degrees
- -- Work on the prop or robing crew, or tyling, or kitchen, etc.
- -- A time when we have luncheons with some kind of program

While it is all of these, I hope that maybe you'll think about reunion in a different light. Think of all the times in Freemasonry when we are reminded of the importance of union or unity. The Scripture in the Entered Apprentice degree is Psalm 133: "Behold how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity". In the working tools of the Master Mason degree, we learn of the trowel and how the operative mason uses it to unite the building, but we as free and accepted masons use it to spread the cement of brotherly love. And then that key phrase "that cement which unites us into one sacred band of friends and brothers". And in the 18th degree, we are reminded by the Wise Master that while faith and hope are key factors, the greatest of the constellations is charity or brotherly love.

## **Repairs in and Around The Temple**

Brethren we have made some great improvements to the Temple. One improvement was replacing old incandescent bulbs out for newer LED bulbs (with the help of donations from various brethren and the Little Rock Valley KSA). By switching over to LED bulbs we were able to lower our electric usage by \$620 January/February YTD.

Our next big project will be repairing the walls and painting the ceiling of the wagon yard. For those that are unfamiliar with the wagon yard it's the quarters where brethren may stay before reunions free of charge. The wagon yard is not just for brethren that are coming from outside central Arkansas, it is also for those that want to spend a time of fellowship with other SR Masons and SR candidates.

Some great friendships have been made through the wagon yard that may have not otherwise happened. When we get busy during the degrees we do not get the chance to socialize with candidates and brethren like you get the night before.

Some other improvements in the works for the wagon yard are bunk beds, shelving, and charging stations for brethren to utilize during their stay. We will also be reorganizing the room to allow late comers and earlier risers to move in and out without interrupting those resting.



## A BIT OF NORTH WEST ARKANSAS SCOTTISH RITE HISTORY

A long journey from Fort Smith to Fayetteville: Freemasonry did not have a home in Fort Smith until 1889 when the Baer Memorial Temple, located on north 6th street, was dedicated. Prior to that date, the four York Rite Bodies and two Eastern Star Chapters met at various places, including upper rooms at the old fort, attic rooms at the St. Charles Hotel or the Kennedy Building at 6th and Rogers Avenue.

By 1920, Freemasonry and its various bodies were growing at an unprecedented rate. Bell Point Lodge had over 400 members and besides a Chapter of Royal Arch Masons, Council and Commandery, the city now boasted three Eastern Star Chapters, Amrita Grotto, DeMolay and Rainbow orders and a second Lodge was seeking dispensation. Masonry and its bodies did indeed need a home.

**Formation of the Masonic Home Association:** With the formation of a private corporation to finance and oversee the acquisition of real estate and buildings, the Fort Smith Masonic Home Association was formed in 1920. To help alleviate the overcrowding, a second, two-story building was purchased on North 8th and A streets. Masonry in Fort Smith was now sharing two separate buildings.

The Scottish Rite comes to Fort Smith:: In 1920, the Arkansas Consistory in Little Rock was the home of Scottish Freemasonry in Arkansas. In early 1924, members of the local Scottish Rite Club in Fort Smith, notably Brothers Fred Kidd, Hurd Miller, J. K. Jordan, James H. Clendening, and Robert Secrest decided it was time for the Fort Smith area to have its own bodies. The committee, while attending the 1924 Spring reunion in Little Rock, met with S:.G:.I:.G:. Charles Rosenbaum to discuss the formation of a new Lodge of Perfection in Fort Smith. Just five months later, on September 5, 1924, the Supreme Council issued Letters Temporary for Zabud Lodge of Perfection in Fort Smith, signed by 33 members in Fort Smith

Zabud Lodge of Perfection was granted a charter by the Supreme Council on October 22, 1925. The first officers installed on April 30, 1926 were:

The first meeting of the Lodge (held under letters temporary) was held on January 11, 1925. The first Reunion of the Valley was held just three months later on April 17, 1925, when 43 new members were made Perfect Elus.

The Supreme Council granted letters temporary for the new Chapter in June 1928, to be known as Fred W. Kidd Chapter of Knights Rose Croiz. The first officers were:

The names of Zabud Lodge of Perfection and Fred W. Kidd Chapter of Knights Rose Croix were changed to the Fort Smith Lodge and Fort Smith Chapter respectively in October 1929, as the Supreme Council wanted all bodies to be named after the

city in which they were located. In the fall of 1952, a letter was received by the Bodies from Brother Joshua K. Shepherd, Sovereign Grand Inspector for the Orient of Arkansas suggesting that the names of the Fort Smith Bodies be changed to the Western Arkansas Bodies. On October 1, 1952, the names of the Fort Smith Bodies were officially changed to the Western Arkansas Scottish Rite Bodies.

In April, 2013, S:.G:.I:.G:. Dr. C. James Graham decided that the condition of the Temple and other considerations in Fort Smith warranted a move of the Valley from Fort Smith to Fayetteville. On May 22, 2013, the first meeting of the Valley of Fayetteville was opened by Dr. Graham.
