I sincerely hope so, because our fraternity is of no use if we do

not love and care for one another. Will we have disagreements, of course, but we must be mindful of our sacred obligations we made before God and our brethren if we are to be true Masons. There is no room for spite, jealousy or revenge in our fraternity; only Friendship, Morality and Brotherly Love. If we all work as one cohesive unit, there will be no limit to what we can accomplish. Remember brethren, self-preservation is an invitation for corruption

and servant leadership is always the best example to imitate. It is also important to remember what our organization is exactly. While we do have charitable causes that we support, we are not a charity; we are a fraternity first and foremost. From time to time, objectively evaluate your own behavior as well as the atmosphere at your Lodge, Valley or Chapter. The business of being the oldest and best fraternity

the oldest and best fraternity in the World is the most important business we have to accomplish.

Brethren, I hope this serves as a reminder for all of us in our daily business. We all proudly display the symbols of this fraternity as we should but does our conduct in the workplace and on social media fall into compliance with the noble and virtuous principles of our fraternity? Remember that being a Freemason should not just be something that you do in your spare time, it should be something that helps define what kind of a man you are. The next time you are about to do or say something at work or the next time you are about to post something on social media, stop and ask yourself, does this portray honor and integrity on behalf of the fraternity?

A Blip in Time

I recently had the honor of attending the biannual Scottish Rite Leadership Conference in Atlanta, GA. As with any conference of this nature the attending brethren were inundated with functional solutions to issues of Valley administration and pragmatic tips for membership recruitment and retention. Truly, there was much to be gained from the formalized sharing of best practices and all in attendance no doubt returned to their respective jurisdictions ready to implement the conference program. While I myself returned home with



many great takeaways, there was something else that resonated in me with a far greater impact, the peace experienced through genuine brotherly love.

In his closing address Sovereign Grand Commander Ronnie Seale admonished the brethren present with the following scripture from Galatians 6:9; And let us not be weary in well doing for in due season we shall reap, if we faint not. A beautiful and inspiring message that on face directs us toward constancy in spreading masonic light, yet upon deeper consideration, I realized the true depth of his message. Illustrious Bro. Seale was directing us all to be steadfast in our most sacred masonic charge, to love and trust one another. Often times we find ourselves distracted by the politics and operations of speculative masonry. We seek appointment, advancement, and preferment, and because we are only human these things breed resentment, isolation, and mistrust. But when we strip ourselves of our rings and jewels, masonry endures. When we cease to don our various colored hats, masonry endures. When we divest ourselves of all of the trappings of our craft, masonry endures. As I sat and looked at the brothers from the Orient of Arkansas who surrounded me I noted our delegation was comprised of KSA, KCCH, Illustrious 33rds, an SGIG, Past Grand Masters, and a current Grand Line Officer. None wearing hats or collars, none identified by their regalia, and all experiencing the peace of true brotherhood. Yes, we had functional discussions, good discussion about masonry in our state, but more than that, we simply enjoyed each other's presence. We laughed, we dined, with those whom we knew little we got to know better, and with those whom we knew well we deepened our bond. More Temple Updates

As you may know, it is very expensive caring for a massive building approaching 100 years of existence. But we know that securing the future of our Temple is one of the most important things we can do for future generations of Arkansas Freemasons. The Temple staff and board members of the Arkansas Scottish Rite Foundation continue to look for ways to update and improve the mechanical systems in our aging building and we are excited about the next step we are taking in this direction. The Arkansas Scottish Rite Foundation has now approved and accepted a proposal from Powers Heating and Cooling Specialists for the replacement of our boiler. We originally operated our building with two boilers, one smaller boiler that heated the north end and the big boiler that supplied the rest of the building with steam heat. After experiencing issues with the small boiler, all of the piping was tied into the big boiler which we discovered had enough capacity for the entire Temple. This boiler is nearly 50 years old and quickly becoming

unsafe to operate. By the end of the summer we hope to have a brand new Smith High Efficiency Pressurized Steam Boiler installed and ready for this winter. It is our understanding that this new boiler will greatly decrease our natural gas bill which will in turn, have a positive effect on the Temple's operating budget. While we are excited to continue these improvements, it is not without great expense. We expect the entire installation process to cost approximately \$125,000. But we know that having reliable and efficient mechanical systems not only helps us provide a better atmosphere for the other fraternal organizations that meet here but it also increases our ability to successfully rent our building and offset our expenses. Fortitude

In the 3rd section of our Entered Apprentice degree, we hear of the four cardinal virtues: fortitude, prudence, temperance, and justice. Our Arkansas Monitor says of fortitude: "Fortitude is that noble and steady purpose of the mind whereby we are enabled to undergo any pain or peril and should be deeply impressed on the mind of every Mason".

As some of you know, travel is one of my passions and recently I had the opportunity to visit the Greek island of Rhodes. Rhodes is a medium sized island, 50 miles long by about 25 miles wide. It sits in the Aegean Sea 225 miles south of the mainland of Greece and about 500 miles north of present day Israel. One of the incredible things about Rhodes is its' Old Town, a medieval walled city built by the Knights Hospitaller of St John in the early part of the 14th century. Why did these Crusaders and Knights build a walled fortress city on this small island? The history is that the Crusaders had taken over Jerusalem in the First Crusade in 1099; thereafter the Knights Hospitaller and Knights Templar become the strongest force in Jerusalem. By 1291, the Knights in Jerusalem were defeated and caused to retreat by Saladin and his army. The Knights Hospitaller moved their headquarters to Rhodes and built an impressive Palace of the Grand Master and a strongly fortified walled city. That city and those buildings exist to this day and is now one of the real highlights of visiting this special place. I marvel when I look at these ancient walls and buildings that have stood the test of time. They stand as a monument to the Knights of St John, but more importantly, they stand today as a monument to fortitude. Imagine the distress of the Knights

as they were forced to retreat from Jerusalem. It would have been easy to simply give up and move back to the middle of Europe from whence they came. But they did not. They had the strength of character and endurance, even in the face of despair, to stay the course and to build a huge walled city that still stands more than 700 years later.

So, as our Monitor says, every Mason, each one of us, should heed the virtue of fortitude. Which of us does not need determination, steadiness of purpose, or steadfastness when the going gets rough? Albert Pike put it this way in Morals and Dogma: "Every man has a work to do in himself, greater and sublime than works on wood or marble – upon his own soul and intellect, and so gain the highest nobleness and grandeur The great author or artist only portrays what every man should be. He conceives what every man should do. He conceives and represents beauty, magnanimity, fortitude, love, devotion, forgiveness".



Scottish Rite Symbolism

Recently, I was asked to write an article on the symbolism used in our degrees for the journal. Having no idea which specific symbol might be a good topic to write about, I sat and examined the seemingly endless multitude of symbols used throughout our degrees. Of course this was to no avail. Finally, feeling the pressure of a deadline for the article, I reached out to a small group of brothers for a suggestion via text. I received a re-



sponse rather quickly stating, "As Above, So Below". Having been familiar with this Hermetic axiom for quite some time, I accepted the challenge. I admit, initially I thought this would be much easier than what it turned out to be and I will likely not do it the justice it deserves. However, I will attempt to explain it based on my own understanding.

"As Above, So, Below" comes to us from the Hermetic philosophy and you'll find it's use in our 27th degree, Knight of the Sun. The axiom is used to describe a correspondence between all things and teach a universal truth. We find within it many correlations to ourselves and all that surrounds us (i.e. Macrocosm and Microcosm, God and man, spirit and matter, etc.). The list swiftly becomes endless, when you begin to give it some thought. It is nearly impossible to describe such an infinite idea! It alludes to a duality and speaks to a common bond. A bond where we find ourselves composed of something more than mere matter, in a place where seeing means something other than using sight alone, and where a word takes shape in form. As we sit and contemplate all that our senses perceive, we begin to an idea of why the word is ineffeable. "In the beginning was the word" and our symbols are only pale reflections of the truths that lie hidden within. We need not focus on any one single symbol more than the word itself. We see it and hear of it throughout our degrees, mentioned time and time

As I began to internalize this idea, I found many things. I found that I am thankful for my brothers their diligence in our quest for truth, and their grip when I find myself in darkness searching for light. I would like to extend my most sincere thanks for the guidance that the small group of brothers provided me with at the beginning of this task and to all Scottish Rite Masons who labor for the love of our gentle craft.
