

Arkansas Double Eagle Albert Pike Memorial Temple Preservation Program

Listed on the National Register of Historic Places, the Albert Pike Memorial Temple has served and continues to serve as the headquarters for the Masonic fraternity in Arkansas. The brainchild of Illustrious Brother Charles E. Rosenbaum, our beautiful Temple stands as a beacon of celebration for the Craft that has now stood for 95 years! Designed by architects George Mann and

Eugene Stern, it was dedicated on May 12, 1924. Mann was considered the "dean of Arkansas architects" having designed several important Arkansas buildings, including the Arkansas State Capitol and the Arlington Hotel in Hot Springs. The building is a monumental three -story structure in the Neo-Classic Revival style, lined on its front facade are nineteen Greek Ionic columns that have stood the test of time, just as our fraternity has.

Many of our members will remember times, even recent times, when the future of our mag-

nificent Temple was not so certain or secure. As we approach the Centennial Celebration of this great Masonic edifice we should also remember the admonishments from our Sovereign Grand Inspector General, Illustrious Brother James Graham, 33°, PGM. Brother Graham told us that we were at a crossroads and it was time to dedicate ourselves to securing the future of the Albert Pike Memorial Temple for a Second Century. Brethren, we have been able to keep the Temple open and if you frequent the Temple much at all, you will notice mechanical and cosmetic improvements that are being completed for the first time in decades. The leadership of the Scottish Rite believes that this labor is worth it and we do not want the progress to stop.

Dwell in Unity!

I think that our recent Grand Lodge annual communication was the most harmonious session I've ever attended. On reflecting on it, it made me think of the passage from Psalm 133 that is in our Entered Apprentice degree:

Behold, how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity!

It is like the precious ointment upon the

head, that ran down upon the beard, even Aaron's beard: that went down to the skirts of his aarments: As the dew of Hermon, and as the dew that descended upon the mountains of Zion: for there the Lord commanded the blessing, even life for evermore.

The session reminded me of the important truth in this psalm. It is good and pleasant when we work together. But "good and pleasant" may be an understatement. King David, the author of the psalm compares the united Jewish people to "precious ointment". This precious ointment refers to the anointing oil that was used in the consecration and ordination of the High Priest. It was indeed precious ointment, composed of olive oil that was infused with myrrh, cinnamon, cassia, and perhaps other fragrant herbs. It was expensive to make this anointing oil and thus was reserved for ordination of priests and consecration of articles in the Tabernacle and temples in Jerusalem. In the Psalm, David tells us that this kind of brotherhood is so good, that it is like this precious, expensive ointment; but not just a tiny amount of this ointment, but so much that it would run down from the head onto the beard and even onto the bottom of the garment.


The "dew of Hermon" refers to water on Mount Hermon. Mount Hermon (pictured below) is a 9200 foot elevation From The Desk Of:

snowcapped peak that sits at the border of present day Israel, Lebanon, and Syria. The word "Hermon" means "sacred", so the mountain has been considered important for ages. The reference in the psalm to dew speaks to the important function of mountains in providing water to the valleys below the peaks. As the snow melts in the spring and runs down the mountains, the valleys below get life giving water. Again, King David compares the concept of true brotherhood, of brotherly love, to the life-giving water that flows down the mountains of Zion. A powerful analogy for us as Masons.

Because we are flawed human beings, we will always have our disagreements. But as Masons, we are taught to find a way to work through whatever disagreements we have in a spirit of brotherly love, toleration, and union. It isn't always easy, that's for sure!! But when we do so, as happened at our annual communication, it is indeed good and pleasant. In another part of our ritual, it is said differently; in the description of the trowel in the Master Mason degree, we are called a sacred band of friends and brothers among whom no contention should ever exist except that of who best can work and best agree. When we do our work and do it agreeably with one another, we are only then worthy of the title Master Mason.

The Jurisdiction of the Supreme Council includes all the territory over which the United States of America exercises domain of powers of government, except the states of Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, and Wisconsin, which were apportioned by the Supreme Council to the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction of the United States. The jurisdiction of this Supreme Council also includes those countries where it has established, or may hereafter establish, Bodies of the Rite, and over which countries no regular Supreme Council has acquired jurisdiction.



The Winter Solstice



The winter solstice is one of the most celebrated astronomical events in the world. This solar event takes place on or around the 21st of December where the sun is said to enter the tomb for a period of 3 days and is reborn on December 25th. In numerous cultures and religions it is celebrated as a form of recognition of resurrection, rebirth, immortality, etc. This resurrection of the sun marks the beginning of the lengthening of days and the shortening of night in the Northern Hemisphere.

The winter solstice is the result of the axial tilt of the earth and the earth's orbit around the sun. Because the earth is tilted at 23.5 degree, we experience seasonal changes due to the length of exposure to the sun. Those who live north of the Tropic of Cancer will always see the sun in the south and those who live south of the Tropic of Capricorn will always see the sun in the north. These imaginary Tropic lines represent the farthest the sun will appear to travel north or south in a given year. This movement of the sun changes and controls the length of daylight in both hemispheres.

Cultures throughout the world have tracked the movement of the celestial bodies for the purpose of growing crops, predicting seasonal changes, mating animals, etc. and generally had some sort of ritual that followed along with these seasonal patterns. Since time immemorial, mankind has found it necessary to trace the solar patterns. due to our dependence on them for growth and birth. The sun is the one thing we must rely on.

You'll even find the sun in our rituals within the Blue Lodge, with St. John the Baptist marking the summer solstice and St. John the Evangelist marking the winter solstice. The ruffians have been associated with the zodiacal signs of Libra (the state), Scorpio (the church) and Sagittarius (the mob) and CHiram the Sun. Those zodiac signs precede the winter solstice and are said to chase the Sun to it's death from October 21st to December 20th. As you can see, there is some very rich symbolism throughout our degrees and the winter solstice is ever present and celebrated among Masons all over the world. (Submitted by David S. A Century of Good Work

On March 23, 1919, Bro. Frank S. Land, 32° K.C.C.H., Commander of the DeMolay Council of Kadosh, was the presiding advisor at the first meeting of a group that would later become DeMolay International. He had told them the story of Jaques DeMolay, the last Grand Master of the Knights Templar, and the young men were inspired to use his story as the foundation of this new organization.



They met in the Scottish Rite Temple in Kansas City, MO, and Bro. Land discussed what this new group would be about. It would be about helping young men be better citizens of our community, and the membership would be the ones running the group while he would be an advisor for them.

In 1925, Bro. Land was coronated a 33° and was awarded the Grand Cross of the Southern Jurisdiction of the Supreme Council of the Scottish Rite 33° in 1955. Bro. Land has many other awards to his name due to the work he did with the youth of his community.


DeMolay was founded because a brother, Sam Freet, asked if he could find a job for the son of a deceased Fellowcraft, Elmer E. Lower. Because Bro. Land was impressed by the interview of this young man, he wanted to help him and his friends become better contributors to the community.



Scottish Rite Master Craftsman Program

The Master Craftsman program is a series of quizzes and essays based on the rituals of the Scottish Rite and is an interesting, by-mail correspondence course. It is divided into three main courses designed to be taken in the following order:

Course 1 - The Symbolic Lodge, consists of 7 Quizzes

Course 2 - Scottish Rite History & Ritual, consists of 6 Quizzes

Course 3 - Scottish Rite Philosophy, consists of 33 quizzes grouped into 10 sect ions

For all Scottish Rite Members, young and old, it will familiarize you and increase your understanding of all the degrees. There is no "pass" or "fail" grade for the quizzes. The individuals who grade your work at The Supreme Council only point you to the correct answer to help you understand the topic question and to increase your understanding. They also offer you encouraging remarks and comments which I really appreciated. As you complete each quiz, you mail it to the Supreme Council for grading and it is returned with an answer sheet. At the end of Course 1 and Course 2 you receive a Certificate and a Pin.

As you can readily see, Course 3 is a great deal more involved as it covers all 32 Degrees in depth. It returns to the ritual by looking for the moral lesson imparted in each degree and applying that to your everyday life. I am currently working on this course and am enjoying the challenges in each degree. At the end of this course you will be rewarded with a medal or pins to denote multiple completions.

I am really enjoying the course and the better understanding of the degrees, and I challenge every Scottish Rite Mason to complete the three courses and improve yourselves in Masonry. (Submitted by: Charles Finlay, 32^o KCCH, Valley of Jonesboro)

My Scottish Rite brethren; we had a


