## The Gem of the Southern Jurisdiction

As you may or may not know, the Scottish Rite in Arkansas has a profoundly rich history that has helped to shape the fraternity not only in our state, but around the world as well. While there are numerous firsts in the Scottish Rite that Arkansas can claim, let us take a moment to recall one special piece of our history, "The Gem of the Southern Jurisdiction", The Albert Pike Consistory.

quickly After outgrowing the renovated Synagogue on 3rd and Center Streets, Brother Charles E. Rosenbaum, S.G.I.G. in Arkansas, made arrangements purchase the corner lot at 8th and Scott Streets. At this time, the Scottish Rite in Arkansas was growing at an impressive rate with Reunion classes

numbering in the hundreds. Under Brother Rosenbaum's a decade later. direction, plans were made to erect a Temple on this newly purchased lot that would serve as the headquarters for Scottish Rite Freemasonry in the state. In this new Temple, the stage that was constructed was much larger than the stage in the remodeled Synagogue. The scenic equipment was custom made and much more elaborate than anything the fraternity had ever seen

On September 18, 1902 the Albert Pike Consistory was dedicated. This great Masonic edifice would prove to be the first building in the world to be built exclusively for the purpose of Scottish Rite Freemasonry. This dedication was such a monumental occasion that even the President of the United States, Brother Theodore Roosevelt, was in attendance. Even the newly elected Sovereign Grand Commander James D. Richardson, the

Most of us are very familiar with how the story progresses from there, the Albert Pike Consistory would not be the only Scottish Rite Temple erected on the corner of 8th and Scott. Even though it would be expanded on two different occasions, it does not take away from the significance of this truly historic Temple. It was the pride of the Southern Jurisdiction that proved the Scottish Rite was a great force, made up of men with serious convictions and with the dedication to spread the Light of Scottish Rite Freemasonry to the world. When you have purchased enough to qualify for your next tab, you will be required to turn in your current tab to the Orient Office.

The jurisdiction of this Supreme Council also includes those countries where it has established, or may hereafter establish, Bodies of the Rite, and over which countries no regular Supreme Council has acquired jurisdiction.

## Summer Solstice Ancient Traditions

Being we have just left summer and passed through the Autumnal Equinox we will notice our days get progressively shorter. At this time it seems only appropriate that we reflect on the difference of ancient traditions seen with the joyous greeting of the summer and the melancholy reception of autumn as the days get shorter and the nights longer.

Ancient Ideas and Observations Surrounding the Summer Solstice - In ancient Greece, the summer solstice marked the start of a new year and the month-long countdown to the Olympics. The Greeks also observed the festival of Kronia, during which they worshipped Cronus, the god of agriculture.

In ancient Egypt, the summer solstice represented the coming of the brightest star, Sirius. Not long after, the Nile would begin to flood its banks, marking a season of abundance from the land. The Egyptians believed Sirius was responsible for the floods and considered it the start of a new year.

The ancient Romans celebrated the festival of Vestalia, in honor of the goddess of the hearth. Married women brought offerings to the temple of Vesta, hoping the goddess would bestow blessings upon their families. Vesta was the protector of married women and virginity, and was exclusively a goddess for women.

Ancient Ideas and Observations Surrounding the Autumnal Equinox - To the ancient Greeks the Autumnal Equinox is associated with the initial abduction of Persepohne by Hades. This event caused her mother the goddess Demeter to mourn the loss of her daughter where nothing would grow for months. Every subsequent year the Equinox marked the return of Persephone to the darkness of the underworld where she was reunited with her husband Hades.

In ancient Egypt the Autumnal Equinox marked the beginning of a new year. The withering of leaves represented a time of rest. They watched for the earth to move into the cardinal zodiac sign of Libra, which is a balance and indicative of the equal days and nights.

The Ancient Romans celebrated the Autumnal Equinox in a similar manner to the Greeks with a focus on preparing for the harvest. Curiously the Romans were less interested in the stars and heavenly bodies themselves and more interested in how they affected the life of man. (Submitted by, David Ponder, 32° KSA)

## From the Venerable Master





## Renew, Refresh, Recharge...Reunion!

In all of masonry, you will struggle to find an event as unique as the Scottish Rite Reunion. Blue Lodge has installation, York Rite has its festivals, and truly, all bodies of masonry have at least one special occasion that occurs with calendar like regularity but the Scottish Rite Reunion remains the most unique and often most challenging of them all. Twice each year, Scottish Rite masons gather at their sacred temples to renew their friendships, refresh their knowledge, and recharge the light of masonry that dwells within them.

The word Reunion by definition means to unite again, and to that end, the most exciting part of every Scottish Rite Reunion is the opportunity to renew the bonds of friendship with brother masons. As I think back, I cannot recall a single reunion at which I didn't see someone "unexpected". There is something about the event that calls to brothers even if it has been some time since they have attended a stated meeting, something about the event that beckons to them, "this would be a good time to drop by even though it's been a while since I have." Whether it's an older brother who might be having trouble finding transportation to meetings, or a brother who just might be saddled with a lot of life at the present time, it's the brothers I wasn't expecting to see that I cherish seeing the most. Fortunately every brother of the Scottish Rite, active or less so, knows that a reunion is a place of fraternity, a place to reconnect, a place to catch up with each other, not just as masons, but as men. Reunion day means breakfast lunch and dinner, it means cups of coffee to the side while two friends catch up, it means walks through the temple as you confide in each other, and it means you get to spend a few hours in the company of likeminded men who possess open arms and attentive ears.



Beyond the fulfillment of shared time, the Scottish Rite Reunion is likewise a time to refresh your knowledge as a Master of the Royal Secret. By design, each reunion exemplifies "required" degree work (and quite often delightful yet optional degree work). Every mason present will once again experience the 4th, 14th, 30th, and 32nd degrees and every mason present will once again be obligated to their lessons and directives. It's quite easy to receive a masonic degree, it's all together harder to remember what it means and to apply it to

your own life and interactions with others. Each reunion is an opportunity to learn what you might have missed last time, a chance to remind yourself of your convictions and to shine a light on the path that began with a lamp and ended with a secret. Indeed there is much to learn in masonry and for the learned there is always the need for a refresher course. At every reunion Scottish Rite masons of all rank and decoration start at the beginning and journey all the way to the end with a renewed since of understanding.

Most importantly, the Scottish Rite Reunion allows us as a

fraternity and as individuals, the opportunity to recharge. There is a sense of accomplishment and completion for any valley the moment the reunion begins. In the days leading up, you experienced frustrations in planning, you worried about the latest rumors and conflicts that are circulating around the craft, and you internalized the pressure of putting on a perfect example of what a reunion should look like. But once the 4th degree begins all of that evaporates. Your valley and all the brothers who have worked so hard can now focus on the experience. The concerns that precip-

itated the reunion itself now seem trivial. The valley can take a collective deep breath, recharge, and pursue light. As individuals the opportunity to recharge is vital. Masonry requires commitment and often we over extend ourselves with meetings, rehearsals, special events, and promised time to a myriad of masonic bodies. It's important for all of us to keep perspective and give mental attention to all aspects of our lives. There is no better place to recharge your mind and spirit than at the Scottish Rite Reunion. The lessons of faith, charity, moderation, humility, and inspiration are all built into the program.





The Scottish Rite Reunion stands alone in its uniqueness. It is both a requirement and a pleasure. It serves as a both a school and a social gathering. It brings us together and it sets us apart. I look forward to a lot of things when it comes to the masonic calendar, and I always look forward to the next reunion...I will see you there my brother. 


