In Token of your Sincerity

On a beautiful spring day in 1945, our Brother and President, Franklin D. Roosevelt, sat for a commissioned portrait at his retreat of choice that he affectionately referred to as the "Little White House" in Warm Springs, Georgia. On the twelfth day of April 1945, life left this extraordinary man that had led our country for an unprecedented twelve years which included a Great Depression and most of the Second World War. On this fateful day, a peaceful transition of power that is so incredibly unique to our democracy was set into motion.

Along our Masonic journeys, how many times have we been prompted by the words, "In token of your sincerity"? On that clear spring day in 1945, over 700 miles away in Washington, D.C., an unsuspecting Vice-President and Mason from Missouri would soon have the weight of the world thrust upon his shoulders, and it is

doubtful these five words were present in his thoughts as he discerned what had just happened to him. More often than not, traumatic and startling events tend to highlight our instincts and principles. How those instincts and principles are formed and molded. Where do they come from? Our families? Our religion? Our fraternity? Hopefully, the answer is 'all of the above'.

Throughout his life, Brother Truman had been known for being straight-forward, assertive and blunt, a fact that only intensified as he ascended the political ranks. On one occasion, as Truman railed against his opponents during a speech, a supporter shouted, "Give 'em Hell, Harry!" To which Truman quickly replied, "I never gave anybody hell! I just told the truth and they thought it was hell." This endeared him to the people, as he stood for plain-talking, fair-dealing and truth. Even though these attributes were refreshing, virtually no one believed he was equipped to be President, least of all, himself.

In the context of our fraternity, a token is defined as a visible or tangible representation of a fact, quality or feeling. Sincerity is the quality of being free from pretense, deceit or hypocrisy. With this understanding, the true meaning and power of that token is revealed. At 7:00 PM on April 12, 1945, Brother Truman was conducted to the cabinet room of the White House and sworn in as the 33rd President of the United States. At the conclusion of the Oath of Office and before shaking the hand of the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court that had just administered the oath, Truman bowed his head and kissed the Holy Bible upon which he had just taken

the Oath of Office. In the most monumental moment, of the most overwhelming day of his life, Truman immediately harkened back to his experiences in our fraternity and declared his mind and conscious free from any pretense, deceit or hypocrisy by sealing this solemn oath with his Token of Sincerity. Brother Truman was a failed businessman from rural

Missouri that would go on to become arguably one of the greatest Presidents in our nation's history. His life and actions showed us that he never lost sight of that Great Light and those guiding principles our fraternity champions.

So, what does this mean for you or me, or the upcoming generation of Masons in this country? Our country is divided, and our world is hurting. But what if the miseries of today are the birthing pains of a new and much needed enlightenment? Turn on the news for a few minutes and then recite the Creed of the Scottish Rite. This country, and the world, needs Freemasonry more than ever. We must be that light that shines through the darkness. Just as Brother Truman did, on the darkest day or during the most burdensome situation of our lives, we must stand up, with sincerity of purpose, and be the example that the world needs so badly.

The teachings of fortitude, prudence, temperance, and justice; the virtues of honor, loyalty, and integrity are more important than ever.

The jurisdiction of this Supreme Council also includes those countries where it has established, or may hereafter establish, Bodies of the Rite, and over which countries no regular Supreme Council has acquired jurisdiction.

** Behind the Curtain, a Department Spotlight**

For years, men have joined the Scottish Rite for various reasons. Some of them are "search for further Masonic light" or "being part of something bigger than themselves". A man can join our great fraternity and find some of what he is searching for through the lessons taught in the degrees, reunions, education programs, and supporting community organizations. What many do not realize is there is so much more to be gained by getting involved and connecting in one of our service areas. There are opportunities for enlightenment on a different level. Shortly after joining, a brother invited me to work backstage during the next reunion. I showed up not really knowing what to expect but was intrigued by what I had seen while sitting through my degrees earlier that year. My technical background had me interested in working with the latest technology, circa 1924. My entrance that morning through the swinging doors to the backstage area took me to another world. I had seen the resulting scenes from the auditorium but had no idea what it took to construct those images. It did not take long to realize the men putting it all together had a bond that went above simple friendships. They communicated without the need to speak, moved seamlessly through the numerous scenes, and was clearly focused on delivering the best experience possible for the candidates. They were led by Stage Director, Ill. John Penrod, 33°, a man I came to respect and value as a mentor and brother.

I spent the next several years trying to learn all aspects of the stage and John was accommodating with his knowledge and opportunities to get real life experience. The stage crew worked hard but never missed an opportunity for some fun when time allowed. Each of us knew our responsibilities but none were afraid to help others when needed. We recognized our work was in vain without the Ritualists and other service areas but the determination to do our best job on stage was never in question. The atmosphere reflected our leadership. Our bonds grew stronger each time we came together. I often joked with John that he joined Masonry the same year I was born. It was mostly met with a snarky comment about my youth but would sometimes refer to his retirement from the stage. John retired as Stage Director several years ago and I was honored when asked to step into that position. Most of the original crew had since left but others have responded to the call to walk through those same swinging doors to become part of a team. I must admit John Penrod has probably forgotten more about the stage than I will ever know. But my hope as Stage Director has always been that I can provide an environment like the one I was welcomed into. One that models developing bonds of brotherhood to a level far deeper than casual friendships. And produces a team of men who can count on each other in good and difficult times.

I am humbled by the members of the stage crew each time we gather. These men sacrifice their time and efforts for the purpose of celebrating our craft and welcoming new brethren to the fraternity during our meetings, feasts, and reunions throughout the year. They work behind a curtain and are rarely seen.

There are not enough words to describe my appreciation for what they do but I do know it is an honor to truly call each of them my brother. I have found so much more over the years working with the stage crew. More than I ever expected when I joined the fraternity. But I am not the only one. Many of you have had similar experiences and that is valuable information when engaging with prospective and inactive members. Let them see the "light" you have found and invie them to join us. 

Happy 46th Anniversary – June 17, 2020



In February 1974, Ill. William Nash, 33°, S.G.I.G. in Arkansas announced his interest in establishing a set of Scottish Rite Bodies in the eastern portion of Arkansas. He explained that the Valleys at Little Rock and Fort Smith were very strong, but the travelling distance for members in eastern Arkansas was too great for them to be active in either one. Thus, it was difficult for Little Rock to recruit and enlarge membership from eastern Arkansas.

The "Letters Temporary", forming the Eastern Arkansas Scottish Rite Bodies was signed on June 17, 1974 by 29 brothers from the Valley of Little Rock. It was decided that the Valley would be located in West Memphis. On July 22, 1974, the first public session of all four Eastern Arkansas Scottish Rite Bodies was called into labor at the Eugene Woods Civic Center in West Memphis for the purpose of installing the first officers. After the ceremony, members repaired to the West Memphis Masonic Temple, located at 307 North Missouri St, for their first official business meeting with 52 members present. The first reunion was held on July 19, 1975 in the Civic Center with 114 candidates. By October 1975, when the permanent charters were issued for the Eastern Arkansas Scottish Rite Bodies, there were 853 members.

In 1982, the William Nash Scottish Rite Temple was completed on 650 South Service Rd in West Memphis. This continued to be the home of the Bodies until 2006, when they moved to the newly created Valley of Jonesboro.

****BEING A RELUCTANT LEADER****

Leadership seems to be a very popular topic these days. Amazon offers more than 100,000 books on leadership. There has been new leadership books coming out at a rate of more than four per day and in 2018 over 1,000 books were published with the word "Leadership" in the title, not including the magazine and internet articles.

As someone who spent most of my life in one type of leadership position or another, I've read countless books and articles. Attended several thousands of hours of leadership training and untold actual experience in Combat, Training and day to day operations in the Military and Law Enforcement.

With that being said, some of the very best leadership lessons I've learned have been in the Lodge. Here are a just a few examples of Masonic lessons that will serve us all well to be reminded of.

In our ritual we discover critical traits; not only of good Masons, but also of great leaders. Masonic virtues such as truth, fortitude, prudence, and justice are also highly respected leadership qualities. In our ritual we learn that we should judge with candor, admonish with friendship, and reprehend with justice – this is great advice for any leader.

As Masons, we learn that it is important to put people to work and give them proper instruction. Idleness and wasted time create dissatisfaction and leads to unrest. People who are busy and have direction are happier because work brings an increased sense of self-worth. Productive work helps us contribute to the world in which we live and gives people a sense of worth and satisfaction.

Our ritual uses the example of the beehive to promote industry and cooperative labor. Each and every time we open and close a Lodge, we stress that harmony is the strength and support of all institutions. We know how easily discord can creep into an organization. Arguments and power struggles cause discontent and will quickly weaken and destroy an organization. Disagreement and debate will occur, but masonry promotes a positive atmosphere where these discussions occur without resorting to personal attacks or derailments. "Peace and Harmony" should always prevail. Whether or not an agreement on the issue is reached, the option to agree or disagree amicably should always remain.

The Attentive Ear receiving the sound from the Instructive Tongue is highly valuable leadership lesson. It teaches that it is important to first understand and then to be understood. Listening is a powerful leadership and communication skill. When we listen with the intent to understand, rather than with the intent to reply, we begin the process of true communication and relationship building. Listening with an attentive ear takes skill and patience but it leads to understanding and earns trust. Once we truly understand each other's point of view, we can then seek to be understood by the skillful use of grammar, rhetoric, and logic. Leaders with an Attentive Ear gain high admiration and respect.

(Continued From Previous Page) The plumb keeps us honorable and upstanding, moral and ethical while the square reminds us to stay fair and honest, squaring our actions by the square of virtue. The compasses keep us within due bounds, freely choosing to do the right thing, thereby setting a good example.

I've touched on just a few of the many great leadership lessons and traits we learn in our Masonic ritual, there are many, many more. It comes as no great surprise that so many great leaders have been, and still are, Freemasons. So, the next time you find yourself in a position of responsibility, try adapting a Masonic leadership style.

Finally, I call for us all to be the reluctant leader, what do I mean? It's not about solving the issue all the time, and being right all the time or receiving the accolades. It's about looking for collaboration, compromise and understanding. We need to be awesome and inspiring.

Our focus should be about connections, collaborations, compromises and openness. When we do this, we are creating safe spaces for teams of Brothers to try new ideas without the promise of a guaranteed hardwired outcome.
