I grew up in a strictly Judeo-Christian background, and in my youth, I just couldn't help but ask questions, or ponder the myriads of distinct and separate religions all across the world. It was in high school during a world history class my curiosity was piqued. Unfortunately, I felt as if it were almost taboo of me to seek further light on the topic of other religions.

I found myself, as I searched, growing alone; however, I was still thirsting for answers. Using my mobile device, I would begin to watch multiple videos on various religious topics. One day, I remembered some friends of mine glancing at "what some people were saying about Freemasonry" on the internet. At that point I thought: "Aren't the Masons a society in which men of all faiths, creeds, religions, and political backgrounds come to unite"?

This would not be the only question answered for me; because I repeatedly received recommendations for some recorded lectures by a man named Manly Palmer Hall. These lectures, specifically "Reclaim The Mind", would have a serious and profound impact on my view of the world around me. The discovery of Hall being a Mason became a serious contributing factor to the books I bought, and the learning of others like Blavatsky, Frank C. Higgins, the works of bro Henry Clausen who himself has lectures available online. Additionally, the study that Hall did on Albert Pike caused me to study some of Pike's life, doing this would expand my mind in a whole new direction. The education that was provided and the world of mystery now opening to me proved that there was something new to learn around every corner.

So, in closing, unlike many others who become Scottish Rite masons only after feeling its influence in the symbolic lodge; I became a mason due to the influence of Scottish Rite Masonry in my personal life before even becoming a mason. It was the teachings of those illustrious Scottish Rite masons that I had studied deeply and revered that spurred me onward and upward toward the light. Having realized that these lessons were not what made them only members of our Rite, but Masons altogether, and it was that realization made me truly seek further light.


Bro. Britt was raised to the sublime degree of Master Mason on April 22, 2016 at Millcreek Lodge #178 and has left his mark on many lives since that day. After being raised, Bro. Britt has not only served his lodge in many capacities, but also served as Master of the Lodge in 2019. He is a member of many appendant bodies such as the Scottish Rite Orient of Arkansas, Valley of Little Rock where he currently serves as the Junior Warden of the Chapter of Rose Croix, Membership Chair for the Valley of Little Rock, a member on the advisory board, and member of the Sottish Rite Education Committee. Billy was also honored with being asked to join the Knights of St. Andrews in 2018 where he currently serves as the Junior Deacon.

Billy has also made his mark in the York Rite as well. Billy currently serves as Commander – Damascus #7, Thrice Illustrious Master – English Council #14, and King of Lafayette Council #8. The Arkansas Grand York Rite also appointed Bro. Billy to both the Membership and Education Committee along with honoring him with Knight of the Royal Arch at the 2019 Grand York Rite session.

Here are some things many may not know from Billy's personal life. Billy was an elementary school teacher, but not just any teacher. Billy was named Teacher of the Year in 1992 by Monticello, AR. School District and was the winner of the Bessie B. Moore Economic Education Program in which he taught the science of economics to children. Billy was also a K4 Science, Math, and Literacy teacher and served on an abundance of committees that developed programs for the State of Arkansas.

Bro. Billy Britt is a hardworking, extremely involved Mason within the State of Arkansas. I consider myself very fortunate to have met Billy, as I am sure anyone else who has felt the same. He has always been someone you can confide in or share a laugh with and if you ever find yourself in the Valley of Little Rock and run into him it would serve you well to say hello and watch the friendship blossom.


